QUT ePrints has launched a **Statistics Dashboard**.

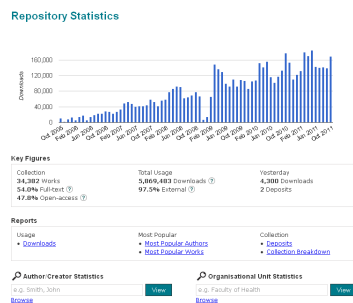
The **Statistics Dashboard** provides you with more information about who is viewing your scholarly papers, how many times your papers are downloaded, where the downloads are occurring, and more....

To access the **Statistics Dashboard** go to the **QUT ePrints** homepage at <http://eprints.qut.edu.au/> and then select Repository Statistics in the left-hand side menu.

The **Statistics Dashboard** allows **QUT ePrints** users to:

- Compare QUT vs. external full-text downloads for every ePrint
- Track the number of full-text downloads for an ePrint over time
- See where readers are geographically located
- Discover popular search terms for individual publications
- View statistics for the entire collection, Faculties and Divisions
- and more

The Royal Society Digital Journal Archive : permanently free

The Royal Society has announced that its world-famous historical journal archive <http://royalsocietypublishing.org/search> - which includes the first ever peer-reviewed scientific journal <http://rstl.royalsocietypublishing.org/> - has been made permanently free to access online.

Around **60,000 historical scientific papers** are accessible via a fully searchable online archive <http://royalsocietypublishing.org/search>, with papers published more than 70 years ago now becoming freely available.

The Royal Society is the world's oldest scientific publisher, with the first edition of *Philosophical Transactions of the Royal Society* <http://rstl.royalsocietypublishing.org/> appearing in 1665. Henry Oldenburg - Secretary of *the Royal Society* and first Editor of the publication - ensured that it was "licensed by the council of the society, being first reviewed by some of the members of the same", thus making it the first ever peer-reviewed journal.

The move is being made as part of *the Royal Society's* ongoing commitment to open access in scientific publishing. Opening of the archive is being timed to coincide with Open Access Week <http://www.openaccessweek.org/>, and also comes soon after *the Royal Society* announced its first ever fully open access journal, *Open Biology* <http://rsob.royalsocietypublishing.org/>.

Elsevier : 3rd Party Applications that add value to SciVerse Hub, ScienceDirect and Scopus Searches

There are currently **35 applications** available to install with apparently more than 100 to be available by the end of the year.

They are available at <http://www.applications.sciverse.com/action/userhome>.

Before you can install an application you need to login to your *Elsevier* account using the login button at the top right hand corner of the page at <http://www.applications.sciverse.com/action/userhome>.

Register if you don't have a login username and password. (Note that this same username and password you set-up can be used to login to your personal profile on *ScienceDirect* and *Scopus*. If you already have an *Elsevier* personal profile which allows you to access your personal profile on *ScienceDirect* and *Scopus* just use that to login at <http://www.applications.sciverse.com/action/userhome>).
